The former consists of a number of cases (usually more than three) presenting with similar problems and the later consists of a case description which is not large enough to be published as a stand-alone case report but, important enough to be published.

I would like to thank all our authors and reviewers to take out time from their busy schedule for contributing to this academic journey which is our common goal. I would encourage all the readers to contribute more interesting and challenging cases from their clinical practice to the journal.
