It gives me an immense pleasure to timely publish May–June issue of IJCCR. Timely publication is a prerequisite for PubMed indexing, which we plan to apply by end of the year. Another criterion for indexing is to have a reputed Editorial Board. We are fortunate to have a team of editorial board members of high repute, both nationally and internationally. This issue contains interesting array of case reports including a misplaced central venous catheter. A case report becomes interesting and worth publishing if a common procedure can be applied to salvage an uncommon condition, which is described by use of continuous airway pressure by mask in a case of subglottic stenosis. Similarly common practices like blood transfusion can lead to atypical presentations like seizures in another case. Though this might be an association rather than a causation. Dengue fever can have protean manifestations, though rare neuro-manifestations of cerebral dengue syndrome have been reported. In this issue we report a rare movement disorder associated with dengue syndrome. *Clostridium difficile* is being increasingly diagnosed in Indian ICUs. When faced with a patient with *C.difficile* infection and having a ileostomy, delivery of drugs through ileostomy is a novel way of delivering drug to reach desirable site of action. Phenytoin is a commonly used antiepileptic. Adverse effect of this drug is being increasingly reported and, in this issue, rhabdomyolysis due to phenytoin is being reported. BRASH is a mnemonic given to presentation of bradycardia, atrioventricular block, shock, hyperkalemia in a case of chronic kidney disease precipitated by gastroenteritis. I hope similar cases will incentivize readers to submit their unique cases to IJCCR. We also hope to start our series of clinico- pathological, clinico-radiological, and clinico-microbiological correlation by our next issue. Till then, Happy reading!
